It's In the Constitution Jonathan Engel



Right-wing Republicans in the United States (and let's face it; today's Republicans are divided between the far-right and the far-far-right), love to say how much they revere the Constitution. And yet they often seem oblivious to what that document actually says. Case in point: the Senate confirmation hearings for Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson, President Biden's choice to replace Stephen Breyer on the Supreme Court.

I'm honing in here on Senator Lindsay Graham (R-SC). Graham is an attorney, having received a Juris Doctor degree from the University of South Carolina School of Law. He has served in the Judge Advocate General Corp. in the U.S. Air Force, first as a defense lawyer and then with the Air Force's Chief Prosecutor in Europe. So you would think he would have a basic knowledge of the Constitution. But he must have been absent from law school on the day the lesson was given on the founding document's Article 6, Paragraph 3: "The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several State legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support the Constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States".

Note that this is the only place in the original Constitution (before amendments) that mentions religion at all. The important part here is that "no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States". It means that a person's religious beliefs are not relevant to their ability to carry out their official governmental duties, and so are not a proper line of inquiry to someone who is seeking a government position.

And yet; and yet; here are some direct quotes from Senator Graham's questioning of Judge Jackson: "You have a wonderful family. You should be proud. And your faith matters to you. What faith are you, by the way? I'm just asking this question because how important (sic) your faith is to you. On a scale of 1 to 10, how faithful are you in terms of religion? You know, I go to church probably three times a year, so that speaks poorly of me. Do you attend church regularly?"

Let's remember that the purpose of this kind of hearing is to allow U.S. senators, who have a duty to "advise and consent" regarding Federal court appointments, to assess a nominee's fitness for a lifetime appointment to the bench. But the Constitution says that there may never be a religious test for public office. So where does Lindsay Graham get off asking Judge Jackson about her religious beliefs and practices?

I suspect that Senator Graham knows all of this. But why let a small detail like the Constitution (which he supposedly "reveres") get in the way of making a spectacle of one's self on national television while at the same time garnering kudos from the radical religious right for your "piousness"? To Graham and his ilk the Constitution is vitally important right up to the point when it becomes inconvenient. Then they just ignore it.

In Remembrance: Richard Leakey, 1944 - 2022 Brian Lemaire

Richard Leakey died In January, 2022. Exploring in the Olduvai Gorge in Kenya, Richard Leakey found fossils of some of the earliest members of the Hominid family tree. He greatly expanded the scientific knowledge and understanding of this family tree. Our last common ancestor with today's apes, monkeys, and chimpanzees, the other existing primates, goes back maybe nine million years. But the hominids did not follow a simple progression from there.

The family tree saw many branches which then died out. This was all laid out in his 1992 book *Origins Reconsidered*. Based on the fossil evidence, the "testimony of the spade", he deduced when and why our ancestors first walked upright on two feet. The reasons have to do with climate changes on the African savanna. Our ancestors





started out as tree-dwellers, but when conditions changed, and fewer trees grew in the region, they adapted to traveling longer distances on the plains. On two feet.

In 1989 the president of Kenya appointed Leakey head of the country's Wildlife Service. Leakey immersed himself in an ambitious program to encourage wildlife and human populations to thrive side by side. He gained fame for taking on poachers who threatened to wipe out Kenya's elephants and rhinos.

Ketanji Brown Jackson – Liberalist Judge and Humanist Ally Confirmed to US Supreme Court Carl Marxer

Ketanji Brown Jackson has been confirmed by the US Senate to replace Justice Stephen Breyer when he retires this summer. Jackson will join a court that is currently composed entirely of Catholics and Jews. These religious groups only make up 23 percent of the US population. She will be the only black woman ever to serve on the court.

She was born in Washington, DC and grew up in Miami Florida. She attended Harvard University where she studied government. Jackson worked as a staff reporter and researcher for Time magazine. She returned to Harvard Law School and served as supervising editor of the Harvard Law Review. She graduated Harvard in 1996 with a Juris Doctor cum laude.

Jackson began her legal career as a law clerk for several judges, including Supreme Court Associate Justice Stephen Breyer. Jackson served as a judge for the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia from 2013 to 2021.

When questioned by Lindsey Graham, R-SC, about her religious beliefs, Ketanji Brown Jackson had to remind him that "there's no religious test in the Constitution under Article 6", referring to the part of the Constitution that prohibits public officials from submitting to religious proof tests.

Jackson limited Graham's spiritual questioning by saying: "Senator, I am reluctant to talk about my faith in this way just because I want to be mindful of the need for the public to have confidence in my ability to separate out my personal views."

Alice Thomas, is associate professor at the Howard University School of Law. She reacted by saying that for the senators to ask her about her faith was not only wrong but unfair. She went onto say, "In an employment situation, you can't ask people about their faith."

In 1797, the Senate unanimously ratified the Treaty of Tripoli, which emphatically declares that "the Government of the United States of America is not in any sense founded on the Christian religion." But today, the separation of church and state is under assault. Republicans lead the change of philosophy by professing their fidelity to the Constitution, which clearly establishes the separation of church and state with the first amendment.

Donohue, Catholic Apologist, Gets it Wrong Again

According to Donohue, "Slavery has existed in every part of the world, and it was rarely considered to be morally wrong until Christianity condemned it. In fact, when the U.S. was founded in the late 18th century, Western Europe was the only place in the world where slavery did not exist.

It is ironic to note that white people today feel obliged to provide reparations to black people when white people were the first to object to slavery. They sure didn't object in Latin America, Africa, the Middle East or Asia—they thought it was normal."

Here are the facts:

Slavery did indeed exist in parts of Western Europe in the late 18th Century, since slavery was legal in Great Britain, France, Portugal and Spain. There was also serfdom in Russia. To be sure, the vast majority of the slaves were held outside of Europe in the various Western Hemisphere colonies of Great Britain, France, Portugal and Spain.

Slavery existed in Christian Europe from the 4th Century C.E. to the 19th Century C.E.. Great Britain did not abolish slavery until 1833, and slavery was only abolished in the USA in 1865.

The vast majority of Christians supported slavery in the late 18th Century, including the various Christian churches. The very Christian slaveowners of the U.S. South would probably have retained slavery into the 20th Century were it not for the Civil War. Catholic Brazil did not abolish slavery until 1888. And apparently Donohue feels that the Spanish and Portuguese slaveowners of Latin America and Cuba were non-white.

Many abolitionists in the USA were not Christians, e.g. Thomas Paine, William Lloyd Garrison, and the family of Colonel Robert Gould Shaw of the famous Black 54th Massachusetts Infantry in the Civil War.
