I'M NOT YET READY TO ABANDON THE POSSIBILITY OF AMERICA Barack Obama

didn't fall for Joe Biden until I learned that he loves the poetry of Seamus Heaney. Anyone who responds to the steady, humane voice of Heaney has the timbre of soul you can trust. It's not like a politician rattling off a quotation from Shelley or St Francis of Assisi. You can't pretend to love Heaney, for he's too subtle for that; a slow-speaking country man giving up his secrets gradually, like a farmer revealing the land's hidden knowledge – and its graves.

Heaney lived through the Troubles and defied them with poems of generous compassion. His peace process in language anticipated – and helped bring about – the political peace process of the 90s. He is a truly great, adventurous writer who proves the devil does not have all the best tunes.

Biden has frequently quoted Heaney, particularly from *The Cure at Troy*, his version of Sophocles' drama *Philoctetes*. To mark Biden's victory, Ireland's RTE broadcast him reading his favorite passage from this play, urging us to "hope for a great sea-change / On the far side of revenge". ...

History says, Don't hope On this side of the grave. But then, once in a lifetime The longed-for tidal wave Of justice can rise up, And hope and history rhyme.

There is a depth in Biden's response to Heaney that clearly goes beyond mere political convenience. He has suffered terrible losses in his life and finds particular solace in this poet who voyages into the underworld and speaks with the departed. This appreciation of one of the wisest and subtlest of poets marks out Biden as a truly rare politician.

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LET'S TALK ABOUT "FORGIVING AND FORGETTING" IN POST-ELECTION AMERICA Jennifer Rubin

There has been much discussion about the need for healing and reconciliation once the vote-counting is complete and results certified. That's a reasonable goal after a hard-fought election in polarized times. Our democracy cannot function when we constantly battle to eradicate and delegitimize the other side. Nevertheless, we fall into the trap of moral equivalence when we pretend the past four years have merely been a fight between two extreme parties, equally responsible for rancor and tribalism.

Only one party has assaulted democracy, intentionally fanned ludicrous conspiracy theories, rationalized racism and xenophobia, and attacked objective reality. It is Republican officials who engaged in or enabled impeachable conduct and broke professional and constitutional oaths. It is Republican politicians, pundits, activists and operatives who compulsively lied and damaged our body politic. Rightwing outlets spread Russian disinformation and created a parallel political universe to deceive their audience, even if they knew at some level it was untrue. They insisted that Ukraine had interfered with our election, that covid-19 was like the flu, that voting fraud was prevalent and that President Barack Obama had spied on President Trump. They have never recanted these damaging falsehoods, nor have they shown any sign of changing course in their quest to distort reality and sow discord.

We are told not to regard our political opponents as mendacious and malicious, but when one side really has behaved in politically and morally repugnant ways and does not change its behavior, I for one am not ready to forgive, let alone forget.

Likewise, I am not willing to let Republican politicians and officeholders — whether they are silent go-alongers such as Sen. Rob Portman (R-Ohio) or active accomplices such as Attorney General William P. Barr — off the hook. It is for this reason that I think every Republican on the ballot who has stuck by Trump and Trumpism should be forced out of power and never again trusted with political power.

We do not, however, need to carry around the weight of the past four years indefinitely. There is a way to release anger and to conduct the business of the country.

First, those officials, politicians, activists and media figures who have done wrong must admit their transgressions and renounce past behavior. Reconciliation is not possible unless both sides acknowledge what has occurred. Truth is a necessary element of reconciliation; otherwise, amnesia breeds injustice and evades accountability, a critical element in democracy. Those who have broken the law (e.g., by perjuring themselves) or violated professional standards must be held accountable. Dishonest media outlets should be repudiated or ignored.

We should continue with clear eyes in successive elections to clean house of those who have forfeited moral authority to hold power. Shun, ignore, vote them out. But do not use up emotional energy inveighing that they never confessed their wrongs.

Second, we need to distinguish between that group of malefactors and ordinary Americans — our neighbors, our friends, our work colleagues. They might have made poor judgments and even voiced hateful views, but they do not cease to be our fellow citizens. Some have already come around since they voted for Trump in 2016; others might quietly realize Trump is a fraud. But they remain in the body politic, and it is those people with whom we must seek common ground. If their complaints are genuine (not disguised excuses for White grievance) and they are willing to operate in the shared reality of objective facts, we should listen, empathize and try to engage with them.

And finally, let's not forget that we have lives and relationships outside of politics. If Trump is defeated, we will succeed in recapturing our non-political lives, enjoying the luxury to ignore social media for hours (and even days!) on end without being drawn back in by some political scandal. It is in that non-political space — which now seems as much a part of a bygone era as going to the movies and hugging friends — that we can enjoy the company and fellowship of Americans regardless of their political viewpoints.

GIVING UP ON GOD: THE GLOBAL DECLINE OF RELIGION Ronald F. Inglehart

In the early years of the twenty-first century, religion seemed to be on the rise. The collapse of both communism and the Soviet Union had left an ideological vacuum that was being filled by Orthodox Christianity in Russia and other post-Soviet states. The election in the United States of President George W. Bush, an evangelical Christian who made no secret of his piety, suggested that evangelical Christianity was rising as a political force in the country. And the 9/11 attacks directed international attention to the power of political Islam in the Muslim world.

A dozen years ago, my colleague Pippa Norris and I analyzed data on religious trends in 49 countries, including a few subnational territories such as Northern Ireland, from which survey evidence was available from 1981 to 2007 (these countries contained 60 percent of the world's population). We did not find a universal resurgence of religion, despite claims to that effect—most high-income countries became less religious—but we did find that in 33 of the 49 countries we studied, people became more religious during those years. This was true in most former communist countries, in most developing countries, and even in a number of high-income countries. Our findings made it clear that industrialization and the spread of scientific knowledge were not causing religion to disappear, as some scholars had once assumed.

But since 2007, things have changed with surprising speed. From about 2007 to 2019, the overwhelming majority of the countries we studied—43 out of 49—became less religious. The decline in belief was not confined to high-income countries and appeared across most of the world.

Growing numbers of people no longer find religion a necessary source of support and meaning in their lives. Even the United States—long cited as proof that an economically advanced society can be strongly religious—has now joined other wealthy countries in moving away from religion. Several forces are driving this trend, but the most powerful one is the waning hold of a set of beliefs closely linked to the imperative of maintaining high birthrates. Modern societies have become less religious in part because they no longer need to uphold the kinds of gender and sexual norms that the major world religions have instilled for centuries.

Although some religious conservatives warn that the retreat from faith will lead to a collapse of social cohesion and public morality, the evidence doesn't support this claim. As unexpected as it may seem, countries that are less religious actually tend to be less corrupt and have lower murder rates than more religious ones. Needless to say, religion itself doesn't encourage corruption and crime. This phenomenon reflects the fact that as societies develop, survival becomes more secure: starvation, once pervasive, becomes uncommon; life expectancy increases; murder and other forms of violence diminish. And as this level of

security rises, people tend to become less religious.

Our earlier study, published in 2011, compared levels of religious belief measured as early as 1981 with findings from the latest surveys then available, from around 2007, bridging a period of roughly a quarter century. In each survey, respondents were asked to indicate how important God was in their lives by choosing a value on a scale ranging from one—"Not at all important"—to ten—"Very important".

Examining how a country's level of religiosity changed over time led to some striking findings. A majority of the countries surveyed showed upticks in a belief in the importance of God. The largest increases were in former communist countries. For example, from 1981 to 2007, the mean score of the Bulgarian public rose from 3.6 to 5.7. In Russia, it rose from 4.0 to 6.0. In part, this growth in religiosity was a response to the severe decline of economic, physical, and psychological security experienced after the Soviet Union disintegrated; religion was filling the ideological vacuum left by the collapse of communism. Religious beliefs also increased in many developing countries outside the former Soviet Union, including Brazil, China, Mexico, and South Africa. On the other hand, religion declined in most high-income countries.

Since 2007, there has been a remarkably sharp trend away from religion. In virtually every high-income country, religion has continued to decline. At the same time, many poor countries, together with most of the former communist states, have also become less religious. From 2007 to 2019, only five countries became more religious, whereas the vast majority of the countries studied moved in the opposite direction.

MAYBE WE'RE NOT SO STUPID John Rafferty

It comes down to this: America's so-called "Christian leaders", who fatten off the tithes and donations of their faithful, insist that "places of worship" should be exempt from social distancing regulations, even as the number of American covid-19 infections approaches five million and our nation leads the world in deaths as a percentage of population. Those pie-in-the-sky snake-oil salesmen are supported, even championed in their crusade to pack their churches and fill their collection plates, idiotically in the name of "freedom", by the Current Occupant of the White House and nearly all Republican governors who are frightened of the whiplash of his poisonous forked tongue.

But a new Pew Research Center survey finds that U.S. adults overwhelmingly say houses of worship should be required to follow the same rules about social distancing and large gatherings as other organizations or businesses in their local area. About eight-in-ten Americans (79 percent) take this position, four times the share who think houses of worship should be allowed more flexibility than other kinds of establishments when it comes to rules about social distancing (19 percent).

Among U.S. Christians, about three-quarters say

churches should be subject to the same rules as other businesses. Evangelical Protestants express the most support for giving houses of worship more flexibility, but even in this group, a 62 percent majority says houses of worship should be held to the same standards as other businesses and organizations.

And while Democrats and those who lean toward the Democratic Party are substantially more likely than Republicans and Republican leaners to say houses of worship should be required to follow the same social distancing rules as other organizations, a two-thirds majority of Republicans also express this view.

RELIGION MAKES THE GENDER WAGE GAP (LIKE EVERYTHING ELSE) EVEN WORSE Tracey deBoria and Hemant Mehta

T wo researchers have dug further into pay inequality between men and women and found that the more religious an area is, the greater its gender wage gap.

Their findings, published in *Academy of Management Journal*, show that in the least religious countries, women earn 75 percent of men's salaries, compared to women earning 46 percent of men's salaries in the most religious countries. The trend is similar when comparing U.S. states based on religiosity — and as the wage gap decreases, the most religious states are closing the gap to a lesser degree.

WAIT, THERE'S MORE ELECTION NEWS

Four states passed ballot measures that allow for adult-use of marijuana. Voters in Arizona, New Jersey, Montana, and South Dakota voted to legalize recreational use for people over the age of 21.

About one in three Americans now live in one of 15 states where recreational marijuana is legal.

The Kentucky hamlet of Rabbit Hash has elected a new mayor — Wilbur, a 6-month old French bulldog.

"Rabbit Hash, Kentucky, has never had an actual person or human as a mayor," Amy Noland, Wilbur's human, said. In a post-election interview, Senator-elect Tommy Tuberville (R-AL), a former college football coach who just emerged victorious from a race against Democratic Sen. Doug Jones, appeared to be confused about why and who America was fighting in the Second World War.

"You know, as I tell people, my dad fought 76 years ago in Europe to free Europe of socialism."

A ria DiMezzo, the "polyamorous transgender Mississippian lesbian anarchist atheist" who won the Republican nomination for Sheriff of Cheshire County, New Hampshire, lost, as expected, in the general election.

Eager to get back to her singing/songwriting career, she conceded happily, but said: "When you look at the election results, don't forget that you're basically trusting your life to a system that accidentally gave my opponent 7710 votes from a town of 1700 people."

Marjorie Taylor Greene, an outright believer in and supporter of QAnon theory, which posits that Democrats, Hollywood stars and media moguls are members of a worldwide child sex-trafficking ring that will eventually be exposed and defeated by Donald Trump, won election by a 3-1 landslide to the US House as the representative of the Georgia 14th Congressional district.

And a QAnon Republican could soon represent Coney Island in the State Assembly, as Assemblywoman Mathylde Frontus currently trails GOP challenger Mark Szuszkiewicz, according to Election Day results from the New York Board of Elections. Szuszkiewicz has a 2,822 vote lead over Frontus in a district that has been repped by a Democrat for nearly a century.

The Coney Island native runs a cable TV political talk show and describes himself as a jack-of-all-trades who has worked as an actor, a truck driver and financial adviser.
